Greeting

I bring you greetings from the village of Kapasseni and surrounding communities. Perpetua and I are now back in Sena and God is blessing our work as we serve people in many different ways. I am the pastor for nine communities including Kapasseni and Sena. The work is difficult but it is making a difference in the lives of the people. Perpetua manages "Kuwangisana", a program providing home-based care services to people living with HIV/AIDS and to over 250 orphans and vulnerable children.

We express our appreciation to all of you who made it possible for Perpetua and me to come back to Canada for two months after three years working in Mozambique. We were delighted to be with our three children and attend Mazalari's graduation from Concordia University and Rafael's graduation from high school in Edmonton, Alberta.

We would also like to thank those who came to the picnic celebration of the 10th anniversary of Kapasseni School at Redeemer Lutheran Church in Victoria. During our visit we also saw family and friends in Victoria and colleagues at Medical Teams International in Portland, Oregon. We had productive meetings with the Kapasseni committee and worked on plans for the next three years. We were able to share a presentation at the ABC District Lutheran Church Canada Convention, and at South Park Elementary School in Victoria and the LWML in Abbotsford, BC.

We cannot forget the Gettin' Higher Choir for their warm welcome and we thank the choir and Valdy so much for their help with the fundraising concert for the Kapasseni Project and Kuwangisana Home-based Care Project.

We returned to Mozambique for another three years of service after spending a week in Ontario with friends and attending the LWML Canada convention in July.

Joseph's salary and housing allowance is paid by donations to the Kapasseni Project marked "mission work". Thanks to the ABC District LWML and the Ontario LWML and many individual people and groups for supporting Joseph's work for the last 3 years. The Alfazemas want to continue to work in Mozambique for another 3 years so fundraising efforts are needed and appreciated so much.

Thanks to the Getting' Higher Choir, special guest Valdy, and all who attended their June benefit concerts. Almost \$20,000 was raised, and shared between the Kapasseni Project and the Kuwangisana home-based care project.

School Report

from Head Teacher Chico Fungulane

The funds raised from the Gettin' Higher Choir concert have been sent to begin building another teacher's housing unit, which will ease their crowded conditions. The community has piled up rocks and sand for their participation in the building.

In June a lunch program was introduced and the students are receiving lunch and breakfast five days a week.

The sewing program has 35 students enrolled. Our plans are to encourage older students who are struggling academically to take up a skill and other courses may be offered like the sewing program. The tailor repaired torn clothes from the community as well as making school uniforms and teaching students.

The traditional music program is flourishing in Kapasseni and a combined valimba group of students from Kapasseni and Kuwangisana worked very hard to get ready to perform for the President at the opening of the new bridge over the Zambezi River in the city of Caia. It was a great honour to be invited to perform for this official ceremony.

Kapasseni School will be receive direct funding from the government for supplies, maintenance and program support. The school grades will increase by one grade next year and go up to grade 8. This means more students will be enrolled and no new students will have to go to Murraca boarding school next year.

There are still 16 students receiving scholarship funds to attend grade 8-12 in Murraca. Antonio Vaz Quembo is completing grade 10 and would like to become a pilot. Timote Tomas Mbuza is in grade 11 and will be graduating next year. He told us that he would like to be a Pastor. Both are good success stories we are very proud of.

At the June Gettin' Higher Choir concert, choir members took up a special collection among themselves and contributed \$1810 for Kapasseni student scholarships. We would like to be able to offer post-secondary scholarship amounts to students who will give back to their community, for example through mid-wife training, teacher training or other skills development. Donations to "general funds" provide for scholarships and the traditional music program.

The children from Kapasseni come from a strong culture of music and dance, which helps the orphans respond positively as they deal with the grief and trauma of loss, and daily emotional stress.

"The music and dance is very therapeutic for the children," says Perpetua Alfazema. "When they hear their own voice and the voices of others joining in a harmony of sounds, they forget about their own problems. It is very deep. The music binds them and lifts their spirits. I have observed this process of transformation and healing many times," says Perpetua, "and I have experienced it myself". The Kapasseni Project has provided funding for several years to the traditional music program, to make instruments and group uniforms, and provide the music and dance teachers' salaries. Thank you to the Letz Sing Choir for their concert proceeds and the Gettin' Higher Choir for CD sales to support the traditional music program.

This little one was starved for affection as well as food, and he has found both with caring and love from Kuwangisana, especially from Joseph and Perpetua.

When I returned to Mozambique, I was very pleased to see that the churches in Sena, Chemba and Murrema had grown and attendance at the other six churches had remained constant.

There was a feast to celebrate the 10 year anniversary of Kapasseni school. The surrounding communities came to participate and it was a great event.

We have started Portuguese lessons for the lay helpers who want to be future pastors. It is going well and when I visit them in class I see how willing they are to learn.

In September we lost one Sunday School teacher because of HIV/AIDS. He was very active and organized our Sunday School in Murrema.

Please thank Grace Lutheran Church in Kitchener, Ontario for the layettes, bandages, soap, toothbrushes, and medication. We were very happy to receive these gifts and they are very helpful in mission work.

We are very thankful that we have received funds to complete our church buildings in Murrema and Sena before the rainy season in December.

Once these projects are complete, we would like to start a building fund for a mission hostel. This could be an ongoing source of funding for the mission work within the area as there is a need for housing medical personnel as well as visitors and volunteers that may come from Canada to help us.

There was violence in some places during the recent national election, but the election went well on October 28th and we are thankful that the violence has stopped.

Health Care Programs

Five baby boys were born recently at our Kapasseni Health Centre. The Ministry of Health is giving baby clothing to all the women who deliver in the hospitals nation-wide. This is to encourage mothers to go to a hospital or health centre to have their babies and also to get testing and treatment if needed for both the mother and the babies.

One of our regular midwives in Kapasseni is getting older and is not able to continue with her duties. The midwives in Kapasseni have a very good reputation and do an excellent job providing care. We have found another local woman, who is also a midwife, to work at the Kapasseni Health Centre.

The Kuwangisana home-based care program is working in Kapasseni with people with HIV/AIDS or other chronic diseases. There are four workers, called activists, and one supervisor. They also work with the orphans and vulnerable children in Kapasseni. The activists from Kapasseni participated in a 12 day training program for home-based care in August. The HBC program is being carried out in conjunction with the Kuwangisana program.

HIV/AIDS education activities continue and we are going to be working directly with Kuwangisana's education and prevention program as it develops.



Thank you to retiring midwife Sara Mairosse (pictured in white) for her faithful service to the Kapasseni Health Centre since 2002 and much longer in the community. Joseph and Perpetua are talking with the community to see if there is a local young woman who would like to go through professional training as a midwife. It would be a step towards the government paying for the midwife's salary.
